### **Biographical History**

The following autobiographical information was submitted by Mary P. Haney, May 24, 2004.

I was born in San Francisco, California, on January 17, 1926, the first-born child of Augusta Foute Pulitzer and Jerome Pulitzer. Within five years after my birth, my parents also had three sons, Jerome, Robert, and Alexander. Both my parents were born in San Francisco. My father's mother was born in Germany and his father in Hungary. My father was educated by a German tutor until he was 14 years old and entered a public school. He attended the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, and Stanford University Law School, and subsequently read for the bar to pass the bar exams in California and New York. He first practiced law in New York City and then in San Francisco.

My mother's mother was born in Sweden of an American mother who died during her birth, and of a Swedish father. She was raised in a convent in France and subsequently in the United States. My mother's father was from Tennessee, attended the U.S. Naval Academy, and served in the Confederate Navy during the Civil War. After the war he became a priest in the Episcopal Church, and in the 1880s was called to be rector of Grace Church in San Francisco, which was destroyed by the fire during the 1906 earthquake. My mother was a housewife and did extensive volunteer work. She attended private schools in San Francisco and the Spence School in New York City.

I graduated from the Hamlin School in San Francisco (then called "Miss Hamlin's School for Girls"), and spent my freshman year of college at Hollins College, Roanoke, Virginia. I received an A.B. degree in 1946 from the University of California, Berkeley, and an M.A. in Public Law and Government from Columbia University in 1947. I began working for the United States Mission to the United Nations in New York City in 1948. My first assignment was as a researcher and analyst, and after several years, I was promoted to Public Information Officer. In 1954, I married Robert C. Haney, a Foreign Service officer with the U.S. Information Agency serving in Paris. Our first child, Christopher, was born in Paris in 1955. At the end of that year, we were assigned to Washington, D.C., where our second child, Karen, was born in 1956. Two years later, my husband became Deputy Public Affairs Officer in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. We lived in Belgrade and traveled extensively in former Yugoslavia and adjacent countries for four happy years. Our third child, Michael, was born there in 1960.

After Belgrade, we spent two years in the Republic of Mali in former French West Africa, and in 1964 my husband was sent on direct transfer to Saigon, Vietnam, where U.S. involvement in the war was on the rise. He was deputy in the U.S. Joint Public Affairs Office of the U.S. Embassy. We joined him in Saigon, but when the U.S. took an openly active role in the war in 1965, the children and I were evacuated to Baguio, The Philippines.

After my husband left Saigon and I left Baguio, the children and I stayed in San Francisco for some time with my mother; subsequently we lived for a short time in Washington, D.C., and then moved to Warsaw Poland, where my husband became Public Affairs Officer in November 1965. The main thing I remember about that harrowing year was that the two older children attended five schools in one year—in Saigon, Baguio, San Francisco (briefly), Washington (briefly), and Warsaw.

Warsaw was a politically and culturally interesting, although sometimes gloomy, post. It was our second experience living in a communist country, but because the Yugoslavs and Poles differ greatly in character, personality, and experience, the way they reacted to and played out the ideology of their governments also differed in many ways. While there, I wrote a weekly report for the diplomatic community on theatrical and cultural events in the city of Warsaw—an important aspect of Warsaw life. Diplomatic life there was very busy, and because my husband worked with the press and on cultural affairs, we had greater access to Poles, particularly in the creative arts, than did those in the embassy who worked primarily on political or economic issues. The biggest treat for me and the two older children was traveling to Vienna, by then pretty well recovered from World War II, about every four months to have their children's teeth straightened. While there, we shopped and ate, in addition to going to the dentist. At that time, it was like leaving one planet for another.

We returned to Washington, D.C., from Warsaw in 1968 and found a totally changed America—we moved into our new house the night that Martin Luther King was shot, followed by Washington bursting into flames of rage and real fires. It was an America that the children knew nothing about and found very disorienting, as did I. The first film my husband and I saw was “Five Easy Pieces,” and that was a real introduction to the social changes our country had gone through while we were moving from country to country and only stopping very briefly in the U.S. on the way.

As is apparent, my diplomatic experience was very much that of a wife and mother, but it gave me wonderful opportunities to learn and build on my political science training and interests and to expand my horizons, and everywhere I made wonderful and varied friends. It also contributed greatly to the work I began to do in our next and final international post, India.

During the years we lived in Washington, 1968-1974, I had become involved in the newly revived U.S. women’s movement. Interestingly, my involvement began as result of active participation in my Episcopal parish church. I became an active supporter of what was then a contentious issue—the ordination of women to the Episcopal priesthood.

When we were assigned to India, my husband suggested that because our children would, for the first time, be away at school during much of the tour, I should investigate possible opportunities for work. I did that. Shortly after our arrival, it became apparent to my husband as he read the Indian press that educated Indian women were expressing renewed interest in women’s issues and that there existed the potential for a revival of the women’s movement that Mahatma Gandhi had inspired. That turned out to be more than correct and thus began a new career for me and one of the most interesting and rewarding periods of my Foreign Service life. I became the unofficial U.S. Embassy’s in-house expert on Indian and American women’s issues during a period in which the State Department required concentration by embassies on topics related to women in response to the World Conference of the International Women’s Year held, in 1975 in Mexico City. But of far greater long-range significance, an Indian colleague and I conducted the first studies on sexism in English-language textbooks used by Indian primary school students and on sexist practices in a primary school classroom. The first of those studies was sponsored by the Indian Ministry of Education and the second one by UNICEF/India. Some of our recommendations regarding ways to eliminate sexist bias in textbooks and classrooms were later adopted by the Indian Ministry of Education.

On returning to the United States in 1977, I became the coordinator of international programs on women’s issues at the George Washington University’s graduate-level Women’s Studies Program and Policy Center. That represented the first time a women’s studies program in the U.S. had an international component. I designed and conducted seminars on a broad range of issues for international women visitors and counterpart American women with interests and expertise similar to those of the visitors.

Since 1985, I have worked as an independent consultant for a variety of nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) on international and domestic women’s issues. As a representative of some of those NGOs, I attended the UN conferences on women held in Copenhagen (1980), Nairobi (1985), and Beijing (1995), as well as annual meetings of the UN Commission on the Status of Women held at the UN Headquarters in New York. Currently I am writing a book on the development of a global women’s movement between the years 1990 and 1995, a time when

women from all over the world were actively and productively engaged in five UN conferences on issues related to environment and sustainable development, human rights, population, poverty and social development, and women's status.

### **Scope and Content**

Materials consist of 27.25 linear feet (56 boxes) and span the years from 1969 to 2004 with the bulk of material dating from 1972-1997. The collection has been divided into eight series, some with subseries. The papers catalog an extraordinary career in public service, especially on the international stage and as such, the types of materials vary widely from meeting minutes and committee reports to speeches, memorabilia, monographs, newspaper clippings, and correspondence.

#### **Series 1: Educational Consultant, India, 1972-1977, undated, Boxes 1-3**

This series reflects the first experimental projects in India to determine if their primary school system and its textbooks exhibit a sexist bias. Haney initiated, developed and coordinated the project. The National Council funded it for Educational Research and Training in New Delhi, India.

##### **Subseries 1.1: General, 1972-1975, Box 1**

Includes publications, reports, articles, and correspondence.

##### **Subseries 1.2: News Clippings, 1974-1977, undated, Boxes 2-3**

Relating to the status of the Indian Woman. Included in this section are articles relating to family planning and population control, education, equal rights, the dowry and marriage, divorce, crimes against women, and women in politics.

#### **Series 2: Women's Studies Program and Policy Center (WSPPC), George Washington University, 1979-1992, undated, Boxes 4-13**

This series consists of the International Visitors program, aging, and women in education. These materials include correspondence, files on participants, reports, newsletters, publications, and program information. The files on aging contain materials considering the economic and social problems of older women. Women in Education/Women's Studies constitute another focus in this series. George Washington University included this Women's Studies concentration as part of their degree program. In addition to General Education, this file contains materials on Vocational Education, Women in Higher Education, Women's Colleges, and the Center for Women Policy Studies.

#### **Series 3: Conferences, 1975-1993, undated, Boxes 14-18**

This series includes reports, speeches, articles, schedules, surveys, pamphlets, and news clippings related to several conferences attended by Haney. The conferences are organized chronologically.

##### **Subseries 3.1: Mexico, 1975, 1986, Box 14**

The United Nations Resolution designating an International Women's Year was adopted in 1973. The United States National Commission for IWY became operative in 1975. One

development resulting from the UN Resolution was the International Conferences. The first held in Mexico City in 1975. Included in this section is Mexico's Declaration on The Equality of Women and their contribution to Development and Peace, the World Plan of Action for the Decade for Women, actions taken, and from NOW the UN Chronology of the Decade for Women published in 1986.

**Subseries 3.2: Houston, 1976-1977, undated, Box 15**

The second National Women's Conference was held in Houston, Texas, in 1977. This was not exclusively an all-American affair. The presence of some seventy observers from fifty-two countries recognized that, as stated in the Preamble to the National Plan of Action, this was "a world wide movement of women." Included in this section is the Plan of Action adopted and individual States' Reports on the Status of Women.

**Subseries 3.3: Copenhagen, 1980-1991, Box 16**

Copenhagen, Denmark, was the scene of the second United Nations Conference on Women in 1980. This was also referred to as 'the Mid-Decade Conference'. In this section UNESCO Background Notes discuss Women and the UN System, Preparations for the World Conference on the Decade for Women, a review of the Mexico City Conference. Newspaper articles present excellent coverage of the disparate aspects of the Conference. Following the Copenhagen Conference, in Vienna in 1982 the US reported to the UN Commission on the Status of Women. This entry also includes papers delivered in 1991 in Vienna on the Integration of Women in Development.

**Subseries 3.4: Nairobi, 1985, undated, Boxes 16-17**

The Nairobi World Conference on Women had as its purpose the review and appraisal of the Achievements of the United Nations Decade for Women which had begun in Mexico in 1975. One of the reports is in French.

**Series 4: Women in Development, 1972-1999, undated, Boxes 19-22**

Contains studies, reports, statistics, women's issues, surveys, newsletters, programs, publications, papers, and conference notes. The term 'Development' refers to the growth and improvement of women in every field of human life – economic, social, political, and cultural. Specific materials include files on specific Conferences sponsored by The Association for Women in Development (AWID) including Women in Development: Theory and Practice (1983), Gender Roles in Development Projects: Teaching Notes (1984), Women Creating Wealth (1985), Strategies for the Eighties: Building a National Agenda (1985), Making Connections: Critical Challenge (1986),

Programs/Abstracts (1987), Development Education (1988), and Development Education: “What? So What? Now What?” (1989). In addition, there are materials on the AWID By-Laws, Publications, and Newsletters. The US Congress Act of 1991: Women in Development; the Coalition for Women in International Development (CID) 1980, 1986.

**Series 5: United Nations, 1973-1994, undated, Box 23**

Includes a history of the UN Decade for Women – UN Background Notes, the UN Resolution for the International Women’s Year (adopted in 1973), Report of the Secretary General on the Status of Women, Forward-looking Strategies for the Advancement of Women, Obstacles to the Liberation of Women, Fact Sheets on the Decade for Women, and Implications of Nairobi Strategies

**Series 6: World Health Organization (WHO), 1988-1993, undated, Box 24**

The materials in this series focus on Women’s Health and Development WHO resolutions and newsletters, publications on health and a progress report from the Zambia Conference.

**Series 7: American Council on Education, 1990-1997, undated, Box 25**

Includes limited material related only to the American Council on Education, mostly reports.

**Series 8: General Consulting, 1969-2003, undated, Boxes 26-30**

This series includes publications, news clippings, surveys, newsletters, brochures, pamphlets, bibliographic resources, and a chronology of women’s history in America. Subjects include politics, national security issues, sexual harassment, technology, ordination, violence, Afghanistan, environment, Women’s History, work/labor issues, and education.

**Subseries 8.1: Ordination and Violence, 1973-1998, undated, Box 26**

Includes Mary Haney’s memorabilia. Also includes materials, such as articles and interviews, regarding efforts to achieve the ordination of women in Protestant and Catholic churches, with a focus on the Episcopalian Church. Subseries includes photos of ordained women from 1973. Additional information about a task force on women’s roles in the Episcopalian church and the general convention of the Episcopalian church. Another topic in the subseries is violence against women.

**Subseries 8.2: Public Policy Research, 1981-1993, undated, Box 27**

Includes materials relating to women’s policy, with information on the Equity Policy Center, the Institute for Public Policy Research, National Women’s Political Caucus. Information on conferences including the First Annual Women’s Policy Research Conference and the Campaign Conference for Democratic Women. Additional materials include booklets and notes relating to women in politics and copies of the newsletter *Women’s Political Times*.

**Subseries 8.3: Labor, Institutes, and Women’s History, 1975-1989, undated, Box 28**

Research on women in the labor market, conference materials on women in the workforce, news clippings on women in the workforce, and materials on women’s history in America. Information on the Women’s Bureau of the U.S. Department of Labor, which protects the interests of working women and advocates for their equality and economic security. Information on the Simone De Beauvoir Institute involved in research and education in women’s studies, gender studies, feminism, and sexuality. Includes materials from the

organizations the Women's Work Force, Women's Network Newsletter, Women's International Development Newsletter, and Women's Equity Action League.

**Subseries 8.4: National Security, Sexual Harassment, Technology, Afghanistan, and the Environment, 1969-2003, undated, Box 29**

Research to promote sexual equity in the classroom and materials on sexism in media, film, advertising, and education. Presentations delivered at the National Security Institute for Women and information on the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission sponsoring a seminar on Sexual Harassment in the as part of the National Federal Women's Week. Also contains news clippings on experiences of Afghan women and materials on women's rights in Afghanistan.

**Subseries 8.5: Resource Materials, 1980-1993, undated, Box 30**

Materials on education of women and girls, including higher education and polls on women's attitudes toward women's roles in society. Information on Hispanic organizations: National Hispanic Housing Coalition, MALDEF, Chicana Service Action Center, Washington Office on Latin America, AYUDA, Inc, and news clippings regarding Hispanic women and politics. Contains an interview with Indira Ghandi, former prime minister of India. Also contains Mary P. Haney's resumes and an application to conduct a comparative study of three generations of Japanese families to examine caregiving relationship and attitudes toward aging and dependency.

**Series 9: Addendum 1, 1970-2004, undated, Boxes 31-46**

This series contains Addendum 1, an accrual of materials that were processed but not incorporated with the series above. Similar and/or related materials listed above may also be found here. Many of the materials relate to her interest in the status of women in the many of the countries where she has lived. Much attention is given to the International Women's Year from the perspective of the United Nations, and the Copenhagen and Nairobi Conferences. In addition, this collection includes materials on subject areas closely allied with the position of women including aging, family, and sexism.

**Subseries 9.1: The United Nations, 1976-1988, undated, Box 31**

Includes the United Nations' Committee for the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), UN papers referring to the Copenhagen and Nairobi Conferences, its program for African development, documents on children and aging.

**Subseries 9.2: Conferences, 1975-1986, undated, Boxes 32-36**

Includes materials on the Mexico City (1975), Houston (1977), Copenhagen (1980), and Nairobi Conferences (1985) occurring during the Decade for Women.

**Subseries 9.3: India, 1970-2003, undated, Boxes 36-39**

Features a collection of newspaper clippings gathered during Haney's several years in India and materials related to two studies written by Mary Haney *The Invisible Woman* and *Sexism in the Classroom in Primary Schools* (a course in Teacher Orientation).

**Subseries 9.4: Yugoslavia, 1992-1997, Box 40**

Primarily, this section centers on the work of the Ad Hoc Women's Coalition against War Crimes in the Former Yugoslavia. This Coalition was formed to coordinate activities in response to war crimes in the former Yugoslavia against women and children in the form of rape and forced pregnancy.

**Subseries 9.5: Africa and Afghanistan, 1970-1998, Box 41**

Contains general reference material on the position of women in both Africa and Afghanistan.

**Subseries 9.6: Aging and Health, 1976-1995, undated, Boxes 41-42**

Includes reference materials on the World Health Organization and women's health in the United States and Europe.

**Subseries 9.7: Family, 1977-1997, Box 43**

Contains reference materials on issues affecting the family including childcare, families and urban life, and domestic violence.

**Subseries 9.8: Women, 1971-2004, undated, Boxes 44-45**

Materials on the Women's Liberation Movement, including brief history and political issues, are included. Additional materials include reference material on women in the military, women in higher education, women's studies programs, and limited material on the International Women's Year. Also included is a paper on US participation in IWY provides a model for successful public and private collaboration.

**Subseries 9.9: Sexism, 1972-1986, undated, Box 46**

Includes papers related to sexism in the classroom and at work, both in the United States and internationally (limited mostly to Europe).

**Series 10: Addendum 2, 1970-2005, undated, Boxes 47-56**

This series contains Addendum 2, a second accrual of materials that were processed but not incorporated with the series above. Similar and/or related materials listed above may also be found here. Includes materials related to Haney's professional career as Coordinator for George Washington University's Women's Studies Program and Policy Center and as a consultant for non-governmental organizations on international and U.S. women's issues. This series contains documents related to conferences attended by Haney, her work at George Washington University, and research files pertaining to various women's issues. The materials include correspondence, handwritten notes, drafts of documents, newspaper clippings, and assorted publications. The materials are divided by subject and arranged alphabetically within each subseries.

**Subseries 10.1: Professional Materials, 1971-2005, undated, Boxes 47-49**

Contains materials pertaining to Haney's professional activities. The items include conference materials, Haney's speeches, and a copy of Haney's article published in the *Journal of Women, Politics and Policy*.

**Sub-subseries 10.1.1: General, 1975-2005, undated, Box 47**

Includes reference materials, publications, and speeches.

**Sub-subseries 10.1.2: George Washington University's Women's Studies Program and Policy Center, 1971-1984, undated, Boxes 47-49**

Consists of documents from Haney's employment as Coordinator of George Washington University's Women's Studies Program and Policy Center. Most of the materials stem from the various seminars and multi-regional group projects on international women's issues coordinated by Haney. Items also include materials from Haney's networking activities with other women's organizations throughout the United States.

**Subseries 10.2: Research Files, 1970-2005, undated, Boxes 49-56**

Consists of documents and publications collected by Haney regarding women's issues both in the United States and globally. These items have been divided by subject and arranged alphabetically within each corresponding subseries.

**Sub-subseries 10.2.1: Development and Education, 1976-1992, Boxes 49-50**

Contains documents related to women in developing countries and the education of American and international women. The items include various publications by government and private organizations pertaining to these topics.

**Sub-subseries 10.2.2: Employment, 1970-1985, undated, Box 50**

Consists of items concerned with women's employment. The materials include articles, newspaper clippings, publications, and statistics related to women's employment, primarily in the United States.

**Sub-subseries 10.2.3: Family, 1971-1994, undated, Boxes 50-51**

Materials relate to women and the family, primarily in the United States. Documents include articles, newspaper clippings, and various publications.

**Sub-subseries 10.2.4: International Women's Issues, 1972-2005, undated, Boxes 51-54**

Contains materials pertaining to women's issues globally. The documents in this subseries have been published by organizations outside the United States and some are in foreign languages, particularly French. Other languages include Italian, German, Danish, Dutch, and Swedish. Most of the countries represented are from Europe, but some materials are also from Asia and the Middle East. The items include publications, newsletters, and government reports.

**Sub-subseries 10.2.5: U.S. Women's Issues, 1974-1987, undated, Boxes 55-56**

Consists of materials related to women's issues in the United States. The items include bibliographies on women in America, publications, newsletters, directories, and a congressional report.
