### **Biographical History**

Rima Lunin Schultz was born in 1943 and is a historian and author. She has written articles and books on Jane Addams, Chicago women in Catholic and Protestant faith traditions, and the culture of urban elites. She gained a Bachelor of Arts from the State University of New York at Binghamton and a Master's and a PhD in history from Boston University. Schultz worked with various higher education institutions, including as a Senior Research Associate at the Center for Research on Women and Gender at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She was also an adjunct faculty member of Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois and is an advisor to the Jane Addams Papers Project at Ramapo College, New Jersey.

Schultz was a past president of the Chicago Area Women's History Council, now the Chicago Women's History Center. The goal of the Chicago Women's History Center is to document, interpret, preserve, and share Chicago women's history and create a space for exploring the relationship between Chicago women's past, present, and future. Throughout the 1990s the Chicago Women's History Center nurtured the Telling Women's Lives Project, later called the Historical Encyclopedia of Chicago Women Project, with Rima Lunin Schultz and Adele Hast as co-directors. Schultz was an editor of the book *Women Building Chicago 1790-1990: A Biographical Dictionary* which was a product of the Historical Encyclopedia of Chicago Women

Project. Schultz stated that, “the goal of *Women Building Chicago* was to write a more inclusive history of Chicago, emphasizing the contributions of its female citizens from all races, cultural, religious, and ethnic groups”. *Women Building Chicago* was named Best Reference Book in 2001 by the American Library Association.

Schultz contributed to other books, writing *Church and the City: A Social History of 150 Years at Saint James*, was a co-author of *Eleanor Smith’s Hull-House Songs: The Music of Protest and Hope in Jane Addams’s Chicago*, wrote the introduction of the edition of *Hull House Maps and Papers* published in 2007, and contributed chapters to *Crossings and Dwellings: Restored Jesuits, Women Religious, American Experience*. Drafts of her contribution to *Crossings and Dwellings* are a part of this collection.

### **Scope and Content**

This collection reflects Rima Lunin Schultz’s professional work and historical research interests. The collection contains drafts of her master thesis and doctoral dissertation on Roman Catholic History in the United States. It contains final page proofs of her chapter “Public School Secularists vs Women Religious” in the book *Crossings and Dwellings*, including correspondence about edits and changes made to the chapter and versions of the chapter. The collection contains materials relating to her Loyola University Museum of Art (LUMA) presentation “Jane Addams’s Dilemma: American Catholic Education in the Progressive Era, 1890-1925”. Catholic publications and articles on Catholicism in the collection focus on Catholic women, women religious, priests, and faith-based and Catholic schools such as Loyola University Chicago, University of Notre Dame, Mundelein College, and DePaul University.
